Dear Brothers and Sisters
You should be reading this in time for Christmas - may I wish you,
and your families, a wonderful, happy and holy Christmas.

I hope that you will continue to celebrate with the Church throughout the season which begins on Christmas Eve and runs through until Candlemas on the 2nd of February. I know that, outside the Church, tomorrow heralds another opportunity to spend your money in the Boxing Day Sales and then its pretty much all over for the secular world. But not for us!

On the way to Candlemas we celebrate the most important Solemnity of the Epiphany of Our Lord. In this feast we celebrate the "revealing", or "shining out", of Jesus as the Christ - the Messiah - the Chosen One of God come to save his people and establish the reign of God on earth "as it is in heaven". This "reign" of God was revealed first of all to a lowly handmaid - the Virgin Mary, then to her betrothed, Joseph, then to the Shepherds via a chorus of angels, then to the Magi who had travelled from afar to see the "new thing". On Sunday the 13th of January we keep the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Through His baptism in the river Jordan, John the Baptist announces that Jesus is the "Lamb of God" and God the Father's voice is heard telling us that "This is His beloved Son - Listen to Him".

All this is to help us see that Jesus fulfils not only prophecies but our hopes too. He is the one who will be "God-with-us" and in what a strange way. We call God "almighty" and "glorious" and yet He chose to share our lives as we do ourselves through family, in danger and in exile, as a fellow worker as a carpenter, as a man who had the gift for friendship and fellowship, as a person of integrity and absolute truth and above all as a man who loved even though it would cost his life. Such is the man whose birth we celebrate with love and faith and hope.

Please read this newsletter and take note of the various 'goings-on'. May I draw your attention to the AGM on the 5th February which I hope a large number of you will attend.

The committee meets 4 times a year and the clergy also meet once a week for Morning Prayer at St Nicolas Church.



This was especially useful since many of the participants had not previously met, and consequently took up most of the evening. Some took the opportunity to be shown around part of the seminary by the seminarians - the games room was a particular highlight! Later, Bishop Richard led us in a period of Lectio Divina and a brief discussion before blessing the group.

All in all, it was good fun and a very successful evening, with a high attendance of around 30 people – somewhat more importantly, much of the feedback afterwards suggests that a good deal of the young people who turned up found it to be a very enjoyable experience.

Last month we introduced ourselves as your Mission Team given the responsibility of taking your feedback to Bishop Richard and incorporating those ideas into our own Parish Plan for the next ten years.

The steady decline in both parishioners and priests over the last 40 years, despite a number of interventions, means that our plan will need to be more than 'more of the same'. That in part is why we are being diligent in its creation and faithful to Bishop Richard's recently released Pastoral Plan (https://www.dabnet.org/ViewArticle/?section=Resources&id=1437&subsect=Miscellaneous).

We are currently working on a schematic of what the parish will look like in 10 years (2028) if we are successful. This 'picture' of our parish in 2028 will give us clear direction over the coming years as well as the flexibility to adapt the plan in the face of unforeseen change. Once complete we must determine priorities for change as we do not have the resources (money, manpower & materiel) to deliver everything at once, this is a 10 year plan after all.

As Fr David mentioned recently we intend to deliver this plan for your consideration and review in early March 2019 but until then we are always available to discuss this work if you can corner us.

Once the plan is tweaked and approved by the parish we will start recruiting those key people to manage the tasks our plan identifies for 2019/20.
